These modules complement technical training by strengthening key skills related to communication, well-being, and professional performance.

They form part of the European Asylum Curriculum (EAC) and contribute to ensuring that professionals are equipped not only with technical knowledge, but also with the skills required to perform their duties in a sustainable, professional, and effective manner.

- practitioners aiming to support their well-being and professional resilience
